Karma We Should Receive and Karma We Should Distance Ourselves From

Rinban Noriaki Ito

This month, I decided to share an article written by my father, Rinban Horyu Ito. In 1982, a few years before he passed away in September 1985, some old friends pooled their funds to publish a small book containing articles he wrote to share in the old Radio Little Tokyo program produced by Mr. Matao Uwate that included our Dharma talks. This particular article dated was titled "Karma that joins us and Karma that separates us"

about I've thinking been translating those articles for our members to read. So, today's article is one of those by written by Rinban Horyu Ito:

"In September, I shared an episode of one of our members who was receiving treatment in the hospital. (Back in those days, we used to go to the Japanese Hospital weekly and check the current patients' list to see if any members are receiving care.) Mrs. S was one of the patients I visited that day. husband who was a Buddhist and was a member of our temple. Although she was not Buddhist, she honored her husband's wish to have the funeral at our temple.

There was something she was worried She thought that since they about. belonged to different religions, when they pass away, they would not be able to meet again. So I reassured her that she does not have to change religions, to be able to meet again after she passes away. So I told her to continue to embrace her religion and not think about having to change.

Someone who listened to the broadcast said to me, "if you say that because of one's karma that he or she does not have to become a Buddhist, then it's not necessary for you ministers to be here in the United States to share Buddhism with the people."

So although I can't go into detail, I would like to share how Buddhism regards such discussions. In the old days when the Issei came to the United States as Buddhists. In many cases, where they

settled, there were no Buddhist temples. So many of their children were raised in other religions, primarily Christianity. It wasn't only because there weren't temples where they lived, many of the Issei parents felt that they should not force their religion on their children. They simply worked hard to create good neighborhoods for their families. From the Buddhist attitude, the Isseis felt that religion is not something that should be forced upon others.

In the Tannisho, there is a passage, "We come together when conditions bring us to meet, and part when conditions separate us." It is good that we share our appreciation of Buddhism with others. Those of us who are ordained should work to bring people into our temples, our tradition. It is our wish that newcomers would join our Sangha. But we should remember that the spirit of Buddhism is not to coerce others to become Buddhists.


Lumbini will be closed for the holidays on December 25th and 26th, January 1st and 2nd.
